

GREEN CAULDRON PANORAMA

Paintings of flora & fauna species

The objective was to portray all 20 species of diurnal birds of prey (active during the day) recorded in the region, several plant species likely to be seen on or near the summit and several species of insects (including butterflies) likely to be associated with these plants.

The following species can be identified (beginning from the upper level entrance, and following the East wall around to the South wall):
